WE'RE CELEBRATING!!!

Vancouver Hospice Society is proud to announce our new partnership with Vancouver Coastal Health

This partnership will provide ongoing funding for our expanded eight-bed hospice, which will allow us to direct our donations toward enhancing bereavement support, and our community home hospice volunteer program.

"This marks a turning point for the organization," says VHS Executive Director, Simin Tabrizi. "This is the beginning of what will be a long and collaborative partnership with Vancouver Coastal Health."

VHS underwent an extensive application and selection process. The internal memorandum from Vancouver Coastal Health states that our model of care not only aligns with their standards, but also their mandate to expand and enhance access to palliative and hospice care in the community; adding that VHS will be "a great asset to the hospice continuum."

Doug Knight saw first-hand the commitment and energy put in to this project. He was head of the Capital Campaign to

build the hospice, and Chair of the Board for six consecutive years. "It seemed, at times, like an insurmountable task," he says, "and yet, no one's commitment wavered. Everyone involved - volunteers, staff, donors and all of our supporters - are to be congratulated for their tireless efforts through all of the challenges we faced to achieve this successful outcome." VHS physician, Dr. Catriona Aparicio, says the partnership will result in increased collaboration and streamlined access to VCH community palliative care services in Vancouver - resulting in even higher standards of care for those living with a terminal condition. "We have proven ourselves to be a significant member of the palliative care community as an independent operator," she says. "We have now been welcomed into the fold as a recognition for our hard work in providing the best standard of palliative care that can be offered."

Steve Mulhall, Maintenance Volunteer



Steve Muhall has been a volunteer at Vancouver Hospice Society (VHS) since October, 2012. He became involved through VHS founders (and long-time friends) Sue Wong and Sue Hurd. His wife, Ginny (a Healing Touch instructor), also volunteers in the areas of Healing Touch, Bereavement Walking, and Bedside/Desk-side.

Steve (along with fellow Maintenance Volunteer, Orrin Webber), ensures the house is running smoothly. Once the hospice was built, Steve followed up on construction deficiencies, created facility instruction manuals, and implemented inspection systems. He also dealt with phone and internet issues, and has done everything from assembling furniture and unclogging toilets, to painting walls and repairing blinds.

Volunteering in hospice has helped him learn more about the dying process. "It's quite comforting to have this knowledge," he says. "Ignorance breeds fear!" He includes other perks as gaining new friends amongst VHS staff and volunteers - and getting to eat the home-baked cookies! When asked about his most memorable moment, he says:

"At the request of the wife of one of the patients, I installed a hummingbird feeder on the deck outside of his room. No sooner had I finished the installation, than a hummingbird arrived. It returned regularly until the patient died. The patient's wife remarked that the bird seemed connected to his spirit."

Before he died, the patient donated some of his tools to the hospice; many of which Steve still uses today!

He encourages anyone interested in the Vancouver Hospice Society to get involved, either through donating money, or time. "It's a great place," he says. "We have a warm and inclusive atmosphere here."

A fond farewell ...

At a gathering on Mar 24th to show appreciation for long-time volunteers, the Hob Too steering committee honoured cherished volunteer, Jenny Shaw.

Jenny, who has recently retired from volunteering at VHS (and moved to Victoria), has a long and varied history with the organization. Back in 2003, Sue Wong (VHS founder), was introduced to Jenny through a home hospice contact. She found her to be a very interesting woman. "We had just founded the VHS, and I was sure Jenny would want to hear about it," says Sue. "Not only did she like the idea, but immediately volunteered to help us."

Jenny helped set up the first Hike for Hospice, introduced (and promoted) the concept of a thrift shop, found the retail space, and spent countless hours (along with other dedicated volunteers) getting the space ready to open. "Jenny named the HOB store," says Sue, "it opened, and we never looked back."

It was also Jenny's idea to do the first Gala fundraising event at the Greek Hellenic Centre, which was a great success. She also volunteered at reception when the hospice first opened in 2014, and worked at both the HOB and HOB Too stores.



"She has made a real difference to how VHS developed and grew," says Sue. "We owe her a lot, and we shall miss her!"

Letter from the VHS Board Chair...



Sustaining Compassionate End-of-Life Care

This month we received wonderful news! After a lengthy and vigorous request for proposal (RFP) process, Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH) has chosen to partner with us and will begin funding our operations as of May 1st, 2017.

This means our hospice is sustainable. This means the sleepless nights worrying about funding long term are over for staff, volunteers, and board members. It means we can continue to deliver the best possible compassionate end-of-life care for those facing death and bereavement. Our service, and commitment to our community, will continue.

In addition to the VCH funding, we have also received funds from the provincial government through Andrew Wilkinson's office to cover the construction costs of our two additional rooms. VCH funding was contingent on this expansion and with financial resources constrained, we are blessed to have this support too.

We opened our doors to our first hospice residents just over three years ago. With funding from private donors we had built our beautiful home on Granville Street, and raised a reserve to get started. A 2013 grant from the province completed our capital fundraising and we opened in April, 2014. Since then, we have operated using our reserve, and the continuing donations from supporters and others touched by hospice; including many families who came to us for the best possible care.

We have made our mark in the community, but it has been a challenging three years of operations. It became clear after a year or so that annual contributions from the angels at our thrift boutiques, donors, those touched by hospice, and our various fundraising efforts, would not fully cover the cost of our operations. Our reserves began to run low.

I give credit to our board for having the perseverance, dedication, and nerves of steel to make difficult decisions; and to continue offering care even as we worried about how to secure funding. Our Executive Director, Simin Tabrizi, did an amazing job of preparing our RFP response. Our staff continued to have faith in the vision and dedication we all shared at VHS. We owe them gratitude too.

We can all breathe easier, and with thankful hearts.

Our work is not done, however. While VCH will fund our basic clinical operations at the hospice, we still have a mortgage to retire. We still have a society to operate. We still have hospice services and outreach to provide in the community. Our basic needs are met, but we all know that our vision expands far beyond that which is basic. Our vision is to provide the very best hospice care to as many individuals and families in need as possible!

Thank you for joining and supporting us on this journey. We still have our vision and our mission to fulfil, and we'll still need your support. But we can all rest a little easier in the knowledge that the hospice we built and started, a hospice which set a higher bar in the standard of end-of-life care, is now sustainable.
